Bob Leinen's funeral took place on 10 Oct 2014 at the Arlington National Cemetery. I had received an invitation from Kathy Buckley, one of Bob's children, to attend the funeral so I decided to go. I was picked up by Kathy and her husband Shaun from my hotel in the morning on the 10th of October. We drove to the cemetery and were all gathered in a room ahead of the ceremony. I was introduced as the man who bought Bob's MG and many family members came up to introduce themselves. A very nice group of people.



We then drove with all family members and friends to a location near the grave. Bob's casket was inside a funeral hearse and was moved to a horse and carriage. We all watched this ritual take place wit the formality one can expect from the military. At that point we left the cars behind and walked behind the horse and carriage to the actual grave site.

The casket was off-loaded from the carriage near the grave and a short ceremony was held with gun salute shots to follow. We all had a chance to walk by the casket for a final good bye and then we all went back to our cars and left Arlington. We were scheduled to meet back up for a catered brunch later.at a nice

Italian restaurant nearby. I rode back with Kathy and her husband to their hotel and had a coffee while talking about Bob's life and his service in the military.



We headed to the Italian restaurant and a nice meal and drinks were speakers and again the MG was mentioned several times with me now taking care of Bob's price possession. Some interesting short

had by all. There were several being thanked as the new owner stories about Bob were shared by





the use of toilet paper; three squares only were to be used; fold, fold and hold was Bob's motto. I was seated next o two of Bob's Vietnam veterans which led to an interesting and informative conversation.



After the brunch quite a few of the guests went site-seeing in Washington. I rode with Kathy and Shaun and we visited some main sites in 'The mall'. Here the picture that was taken at the WW II memorial. After that we all went our own way. I stayed until Sunday to do some more site-seeing before my departure.














Ohio Covered Bridge Tour 2014

They say the third time is the charm - that's what I was hoping for as I started south on a crisp fall day for the start of the 2014 Ohio Covered Bridge Tour in my TC. (As you may remember in 2012, my TC made it as far as Livonia before the brakes went out. In 2013, my TC made it down to Ohio, but the rain kept it bundled up at the hotel and it didn't get to drive over any covered bridges.)

At the first meeting spot in Monroe were Dick & Carol Axford with their 53 TD, George & Rita Patrick (no MG), and myself. The next stop was Wildwood Preserves in Toledo where we picked up Andy & Marla Boyle with their Jaguar, Andy Jr & Amanda in a T-Bird and our photographer, Marc Stump. The Metropark is a nature reserve with tons of trails, a covered bridge and several historical buildings such as the Manor House. This home was built for Robert A Stranahan, founder of the Champion Spark Plug Company.











From there we headed south to the hotel in Tiffin. The drive was a bit challenging with all the traffic and we got separated, but everyone made it there where we met up with Jim Pesta and a Y Type. So far, so good for my TC - running perfectly.

For dinner that night we drove out into the sunset to the Plank Road Tavern for a fish fry and good car talk. Saturday we headed out to see the bridges.

Mull Bridge in Fremont (built in 1851, closed to traffic in 1962 - Town Lattice Truss - 100 feet long)











Blanchard River Bridge in Findlay (built in 2009 - Pratt Through Truss - 125 feet long)





Parker Bridge in Upper Sandusky (built in 1878, burnt in 1991, renovated in 1992 - Howe Through Truss - 182 feet long)
