This castle is the perfect venue for our British Car Club event.


Invitations for this event will be mailed out mid-November. All the information about the Dinner will be provided in the invitation.

Bleeding the Master Cylinder



When you are your changing master cylinder on anv car it is imperative that you bleed the master cylinder before installing it in the car.

It is much easier to it do on the workbench where you can see that the Master cylinder is operating properly before you install it. On TD's and TF's the master cylinder is easy enough to get to, so even if you would have to remove it to check it is no big deal.

This photo shows the short brake line that is screwed into the outgoing fitting at the bottom left and travels to the inlet of the master cylinder (top right).



The image is a new master cylinder being held tightly in a vise. You will notice that the fitting at the bottom rear of the cylinder has been installed onto the new master cylinder. SEE THE BOTTOM LEFT OF THE MASTER CYLINDER. This fitting is about 1" long and has a male thread which screws into the master cylinder on one side and has a female tread on the other side where the brake line from the three way fitting on the frame rail screws into.

To make sure there is no air trapped inside of the Master cylinder you can take a short brake line with the correct fitting and screw it

into the fitting at the rear of the master cylinder. This line needs to just be long enough to reach the filling opening of the master cylinder (see above photo).





This photo shows where the other end of the temp. brake line should end up. What you've just done is create a loop of brake fluid that goes out of the master cylinder and back into the filler inlet. You are not using any additional fluid.

At this point, fill the master cylinder with the brake fluid of your choice. Take a medium sized screwdriver and insert it into the space where the plunger from the brake pedal goes into the master cylinder. You are now ready to bleed the master cylinder. Leave the top off of the master cylinder and proceed to push the screwdriver into the master cylinder. You should see fluid coming from the rear outlet back into the filler inlet. It may not start to come out until the third or fourth push. You should see fluid come out with a small amount of air also coming out with the fluid. This is normal, don't panic. After a couple of more plunges the fluid coming out should be free from air.

Now all you need to do is install the cap, take the master cylinder to the frame rail and re-install the master cylinder. You can now remove the temp. brake line from the master cylinder and insert the line from the frame rail and tighten all fittings. The master cylinder has now been successfully re-installed.

You need to address any other issues you might have with your braking system before you bleed the entire system.

What I have found and what I use on every brake job are the springloaded bleeder valves. They make bleeding a one-man/women job. I have these valves in stock at the shop. They are \$8.00 a piece and you will need two for the front and two for the rear.

If you choice of brake fluid is silicone, bleeding will take a little longer because it separates into many small air bubbles during the bleeding process. Dot 3 or 4 is a little easier. Your choice.

Take the car out for a test drive and take the car to a very large parking lot where you can get the car up to about 30-40 miles per hour and do a panic stop. I don't mean just step on the brakes, I mean act as though you just looked up and saw that your daughter just fell off of her bike into the street in front of you, PANIC STOP!

The car should lock up all four brakes with the pedal on the first attempt, no pumping the brakes! If they don't then you have more work to do on the braking system.

I'm not going to go into the other issues at this point, I have addressed them in other tech articles.
