

The rear end is a complete system that does many things for your car. However, it does need to be checked every time the car is serviced. If you do all of your own work, you must always inspect the rear end.

Sometimes a problem will just sneak up on you. Sneak up on you may be a misnomer, if you are paying attention you will see, hear, smell, or feel it coming.

Just recently I received the rear end housing in exchange for a 4.3 conversion that I supplied to a customer. Now I have seen quite a few rear housings over the years and some show different indications of issues that the car was having.

I know that the owner was having issues with his car. He knew it but did not know that it should not be happening. I also know that he did not service his own car and his service provider never saw the signs nor asked him about what the car felt like while driving the car. These issues would have been clearly evident while the rear end was still in the car, but the questions were never asked of the owner.

One of the interesting things that I have noticed over the years is that most people who drive these cars hear all of the horror stories about how fragile and expensive the repairs are. It seems that everyone wants to believe that their problem is too expensive to fix so they put it off and convince themselves that it is just how the car is supposed to feel.



Another thing I find interesting is almost everyone who diagnoses his own problem will decide that whatever the issue is it will be the most complicated and expensive repair he can think of.

In reality, it is usually the simplest repair that was put off so long it turned into a much more complicated issue.



This is what I found in the must current housing that can into the shop. The housing was completely covered with oil grease and road dirt. It was hard to see what was happening in these areas. After a complete cleaning of the housing, this photo shows of one end of the housing where the U-bolts connect the housing to the springs.

This condition exists at both ends of this housing. That "polished" area on the top of the housing shows that the U-bolts were loose, moving back and forth wearing away the material where the housing and bolt contact each other. This wear will eventually cause either the housing or the bolt to fail. The following three photos show the conditions on other cars that could lead to the wear shown on the original axle housing above.



Left photo shows a rubber pad that has dried out and is breaking apart.

This wear occurs when the rubber spring pads either harden and break apart or they get covered with a fluids

that deteriorate the pads. Brake fluid, rear end gear oil, or possibly even hydraulic fluid from the rear shocks can cause this type of damage.

The photo to the right shows what looks to be a leaking axle seal that has allowed gear oil to cover the back of the backing plate and rubber bits. (oil has not deteriorated the rubber parts yet).





The photo at left shows the oily area around the rubber pads. This oil probably came from somewhere other than the axle seal because the backing plate is clean and dry.

Again, evidence of this leak can be seen very early on, either on the ground under the rear of the car or fluid on the back of the tires.

If you have not see any leaking fluid, Then the nuts of the U-bolts are loose.

If during your yearly inspection you discover a situation as pictured in the photo at right, you have loose U-bolts. Even though the U-bolts look tight the rust colored area around the U-bolts indicate that the axle housing is moving around under the U-bolt. The second U-bolt is covered with crud. If you look closely, you can see that the crud is slightly worn away from the bolt. This would indicate that the right side U-bolt was also loose.

This photo shows the problem in its very early stages. It is hard to see but the rubber pad has already cracked apart.



As the housing, U-bolts, or pads wear, the entire rear axle will move around more and more. The result of this axle housing moving around independently of the car you will be able to feel the car trying to turn when you step on the accelerator. This condition is called rear steering. If you drive the car all of the time, this condition is quite noticeable.

These are only two ways to identify the problem. This is why a yearly inspection is very important to head off a major repair.

How does this turn into a major repair? First, the walls of the axle tube that extends from the center diff. to the backing plate end is only about 1/8" thick. As you can see in the top photo of the previous page, at least half of the tube wall has been worn away. This housing is just on the verge of being unusable.

With any further wear on the top half of the tube can cause it to sag or even collapse. This wear will then allow the axles, axle bearings, seals, and tires to wear prematurely.

Filling the grooves with a good quality epoxy can salvage this housing.

Rear End Issues continued...



This is a photo of the same area as the original photo that was seen at the top of the preceding page. It has been filled with epoxy, sanded, and painted. The buffer pad will now slip over the axle housing and make constant contact between the U-bolts and axle housing.




When re-installing the rear end housing, one should always use an MGA buffer plate (Moss part 267-560), new U-bolts, and rubber spring pads.

Installing these plates on your car at any time can eliminate any additional wear of the housing. As I have said, over and over, a lot of expensive repairs can be avoided if you just check over and under the car every year. We all know the cars look pretty, but you just have to look a little deeper. Driving the car consists more than just looking at the car. Driving is part what you see, part what you hear, part what you smell, and part what you feel.

MG TD- TF Safety Tech Tip



<u>Fact</u>: When driving your MG, if your steering wheel comes off the steering column in your hands, you have entered a very unsafe condition, especially if you are traveling "at speed".

Twenty years ago, while traveling in the green TD with my 5 year old daughter Bonnie, exactly that occasion occurred. It is something not easily forgotten. I was traveling 40 mph, East on Ford Road, approaching Beech Daly, in the right lane of a 3 lane road. The steering wheel "dropped" in my lap. Bonnie thought it was funny and I remember he saying "Dad, do you want me to steer?"

A non-steering MG, or any vehicle for that matter, is a danger to all involved when on a public road at speed. For my situation, I knew my procrastination on getting around to fixing the front brakes made the MG veer to the right. I coasted for a block, saw an empty parking lot to the right, hit the brakes and the car luckily veered into the lot, "on its' own", and stopped. Bonnie thought it was great fun when I handed her the "steering' wheel. My hands where shaking...

Examination revealed a basic flaw, in my opinion, of the matter in which a TD-TF steering wheel is affixed to the column. The wheel center has a slot for a "Woodruff" key which has a matching slot located on the steering column. Once the steering wheel is slid onto the column and woodruff key, locking both together as a steering "unit", the steering wheel is held or secured from sliding back off by a large nut.

The flaw, and what occurred in my thrill ride, was that the nut loosened up and fell off, hidden and loose behind the plastic cover with the pretty MG logo. Any slight pull on the steering wheel slid and pulled the steering wheel right off of the steering column, and woodruff key. Result? No steering.

A TC and other prewar MDs have grooves on the steering column, no woodruff key, so one can easily remove it while at a traffic light when someone makes a comment about driving on the wrong side of the car, "here's the wheel, you want to drive?" always gets a laugh as the steering wheel is easily slipped back on the column grooves before the light turns green.

However, with a TD-TF, (also MGA), when the nut falls off, the wheel comes off the steering column, the woodruff key falls out, you are, as the saying goes, "SOL".

Fortunately, there is a "two minute" fix so you will never lose your steering wheel function.

First, remove the plastic cover with the MG logo, there is single chrome screw on the side that secures the cover.

Second, check to see that the large nut is tight. See Photo #1

Third, wad up into a ball a piece of "duct tape", and place it, not tape it, on top of the nut.

Fourth, replace the plastic cover.

The wad of duct tape will, with the pressure of the plastic cover, keep the nut from turning off from vibration. Sure, there are other 'fancy' fixes like Loctite or a star washer under the nut, but I promised a "two minute fix" and it just happens to be the fix I used in that parking lot with Bonnie.

The duct tape, which I had with me at the time, did the job, got us back on the road again, and that same simple fix has worked admirably, untouched for 20 years, for the last 70,000 miles in the green TD.

In December we lost the nicest person I have ever known. His bear hugs and contagious warm smiles will forever be missed.

Gene's Southern Gentleman charm stemmed from his childhood upbringing in Tennessee where he stayed with his aunt & uncle on their farm while his parents worked at the automotive factories in Detroit (probably where his love of the automotive can from). He came to live with his parents when he was 8 years old - quite the culture shock, coming from a one room school house environment to Michigan Avenue and 15th Street in Detroit. His father who taught sniper teams in the US Army, quickly taught Gene to become a competent boxer. Gene shared many stories with me about his days competing in local youth boxing tournaments and the trophies he would bring home.

But my most favorite childhood story he told me was about him pursuing his dream of becoming a "Business Man". He would go to the doughnut factory by his home and take the doughnuts that were set aside for the local animal feed because they had fallen on the floor and could not be sold. He would then re-powder sugar them with his buddy and package them in doughnut boxes they took from the back of the factory. Thev would then carry the doughnuts in their sellina bicvcle baskets. to the local businesses on Michigan Avenue. They got away with it, pocketing a full 10 cents for each dozen, until his buddy's sister found out and ratted them out to their parents.

With his determination, Gene did become that successful Business Man he dreamed of.

He started in the glass business with his first wife and lifelong business partner, Joan. And then went on to many other endeavors such as construction companies, ending up with his ultimate passion - classic car restoration.

Gene belonged to many of the car clubs, Motor City Packards, Sports Club of America, Jaguar Affiliates Group of Michigan, Cadillac LaSalle Club, AACA, Classic Car Club, VMCCA, the Michigan MGT Club and others. He played integrate roles in each of these clubs, especially with organizing events and activities, hosting many Tech Sessions. Our club visited his Livonia shop back in 2011 where we got to see his prized procession the 1938 Packard Model 1605 Convertible Sedan - Big Red.



I think if I had to pinpoint the moment that Gene and I became friends - it was at that Tech Session. He had in his display case a really nice award plate from an Auburn meet that I liked. I played it up on how I was going to steal it resulting in playful comments from him on required strip searches before leaving his shop. He had a non-threating flirty demeanor that always made me smile. He surprised me years later with the gift of that plate - I couldn't believe that he remember, but that's how nice he really was. His sense of humor has caught all of us by surprise a time or two. One of those events was at a monthly meeting when Gene declared to everyone that it was his birthday. We all wished him a Happy Birthday and Melody Klemmer even did her Marilyn Monroe rendition of sitting on his lap and singing to him. People even bought his dinner. This was in June - his birthday was in October. He seem to have several birthdays each year.

Another example was on our last Fall Color We toured the Hudson museum in Tour. We were looking at the Kaiser Ypsilanti. vehicles there when I asked him if he knew why they use a buffalo in their logo. As he started to speak, a small crowd of our club and people he knew from the Model A Club that was visiting that day gathered to hear what he said, sort of like the old EF Hutton commercials. He explained that the native American word for buffalo was Kaiser. A few of the men thanked him for clearing that up and I'm sure they went home telling their friends about it. It wasn't until we were back in the car driving to our next stop that Gene turned to me and said he had to confess something. He smiled from ear to ear as he told me that he made up the whole Kaiser story. I laughed so hard tears were running down my face. I'm sure there are people still from that day thinking the work for buffalo is Kaiser. I loved the way he could so playfully declare something and everyone believed him. He really did believe that you should have fun in life. I'm sure everyone that knew him is now picturing that boyish playful smile that he had.

We have spent many fun times with Gene throughout the years in our club. He will be truly missed.














Spring Round Up





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
