Couple gear up for the British Invasion

Ken and Melody Klemmer "are preservationists at heart." They live in a historic home built in 1925, and a favorite pastime is driving their antique cars. The Klemmers buy and sell different vintage models every few years.

"I've had American cars, Model Ts and involvement with the Franklins," said Ken, who has also owned Austin-Healey, Lotus and Mini Cooper cars. "We don't tend to keep them for very long. There are so many cool ones out there that we want them all. We buy them and we fix them up. We drive them for a year or two and then we sell them and buy something else."

The newest collection includes a cerulean blue prewar 1930 "Wiggy" MG M-Type they bought in 2022, and a maroonish/black prewar 1931 "Edwin" MG D-Type they've owned since 2023. Neither car is its original color although the M-Types were available in blue. According to Ken, most early D-Types were black, and then green and red were available often in two-tones.

The Farmington Hills residents belong to several MG car clubs, including the Windsor-Detroit MG Club; the North American MMM Register, which stands for Midget, Magna and Magnette; and Melody is president of the Michigan Chapter of the New England MG T Register, and Ken is the vice president.

The couple attend many local British car shows or drive through country roads with other MG enthusiasts, stopping for ice cream, at cider mills or museums for friendship and camaraderie. The annual Old Car Festival at Greenfield Village in Dearborn is a favorite spot. The national Gathering of the Faithful is another regular haunt. There are a few different locations, and the Klemmers frequent the central show in the Midwest.

Ken has studied the history of the MGs extensively. "This M-Type we have, they built 3,000 of those cars. Quite a few survived, I would say close to 500 worldwide, which is shocking for a car like that," Ken said. "It was just a cheap sports car. It's got a wood body. It rotted and rust-

ed and it went through World War II. They were loved so much. People hung onto them and didn't junk them when they got old.

"The D-Type is the rarest road car MG made. They only made 250 in total. There's about 40 in the original condition still left. The guys at the MG factory would be shocked to know that we're still driving these 100 years later," Ken said. "MG was super prolific in the early years. They built a lot of different models. They were very innovative. There were some really interesting things with chassis and suspension."

There are different groups of MGs, depending on the year the model was built. Because they are English cars, the steering wheel is on the right side.

"The Triple-M cars are the cars we like to specialize in. Those were built from 1929 through 1935, 1936," Ken said. "The Triple-M cars had innovative suspension systems. Very quick steering, very nimble cars, very lightweight." The style also had small, high-RPM engines with overhead cams. "The overhead cam was kind of unusual for that time. It made for a very high revving engine," Ken said. "These cars were all raced in amateur and professional racing. The racing scene in the 1930s in England was big, and then a lot of those cars would go over to Europe to race there as well."

The Klemmers take out their cars often, several times a week, even in less-than-favorable weather. That includes trips to the grocery store, meetings and out to dinner. There are times they feel like they are in a time warp and even dress in 1930s clothing and wear race jackets. A third passenger sometimes is their dog, Cocoa Puff.

"You're on the wheel on the other side, so there is already a difference there," Ken said. "It looks intimidating, but it's easy." It's guaranteed they'll meet people who want to know all about the MGs. "The looks on the kids' faces," said Melody, who always lets people sit in the cars. "We let them in. We take pictures with them."

"People come up to you and talk to you about them," Ken said, who challenges teens to try to figure out how to start the MGs. "The most prevalent question is, 'Did GM build these?' because they see the MG and they reverse the letters." Melody said many want to know if the 1930 "Wiggy" MG M-Type is a boat.

The Klemmers attribute the MG's popularity to different factors. "It's a passion," Melody said.

"Cars were bought by young people and they traded around a lot," Ken said. "Also, the war and the Depression helped because Britain was in such austerity by the time the war started. After that, people couldn't afford to buy new cars so they kept old cars running for a long time. They patched them up and they made them work and they stayed on the road. That's why we have a pretty high survival rate for British cars."

Ken discovered MGs when he was a preteen after reading the book, "The Red Car," by Don Stanford. "That really had a formidable allure to me," Ken said. His father also made an impact.

"My dad was a designer for Chrysler, and I had been around cars all my life," Ken said. "But my dad always bought really boring cars, and the MGs sounded so exotic. But he told me about MGs. The MGs sounded exciting."

CHALLENGE #1: Spell out "John Thornley" with the first letter of a Michigan city or town. Take a photo. Your car must be visible, as well as the marker, entry sign, post office, police station or other landmark identifying the location. A different municipality must be used for each letter. For example: Jennison, Ontonagon, Hancock, Newberry, Trout Lake, Houghton, Ossineke, Rapid River, Naubinway, L'Anse, Escanaba, Yale. **J-o-h-n-T-h-o-r-n-l-e-y.** Easy peasy!

Email all 12 photos for this Challenge at the same time. You may use more than one email but please use the following format in the subject line: the letters in the included photos and 1of 4, 2 of 4, 3 of 4. Eg.: "JOH 1 of 5." Next email "NTHO 2 of 5," etc. You can put as many "letters" into one email as your email service can accommodate. Just label them. Completion of this Challenge will garner you **500** points.

CHALLENGE #2: Lenny Bruce once said, "I hate small towns because once you've seen the cannon in the park there's nothing else to do." Would you believe a dead comedian? Why, Michigan is full of small towns — some with canons and some without. You do not need to visit the towns that do not have canons. Drive to towns with canons and take a

Similarly, anything with more than one barrel won't count. Fire Extinguisher Recall!

Below is a note from someone (Miami Mike) who wrote to Hagerty about fire extinguishers, something every shop and garage should have handy. I have at least ten Halotron units at Belden. I am going to be checking handles tomorrow! Read on to see why......


Fire extinguisher . . . if it has a plastic handle, it has been recalled. Kidde will GIVE you a brand new extinguisher to replace it and even ship it to you for free. Problem is that after a few years the plastic handles get brittle and break off and then the extinguisher is useless. Call Kidde – toll free – read them the code number, then sit back and in a few days the replacement – with metal handles – arrives.

These things are everywhere, homes, garages, offices, boats, RVs, if it has a plastic handle it is NO GOOD and NOT SAFE. Kidde also made a bunch of extinguishers under private labels, so even if the label doesn't say Kidde, they may still have to replace it. You probably have more of these things than you think, so look around carefully.

EDITOR'S NOTE: A check of the Kidde website revealed only certain plastic handle extinguishers are included in the recall.





Water in Your Gas Tank?

Pilfered from an unknown source

There is an easy way to find out if you have water contamination in your petrol tank. Splash out a mere £12 on a tube of *Kolor Kut Water Finding Paste* available from Amazon (other brands and vendors exist). This product has the consistency of toothpaste and is a beige-golden color. Coat the bottom 20mm of a *cleaned* of some sort (the author suggests bamboo— perhaps he's in Thailand) with the paste and carefully probe down to the base of your tank. Withdraw the cane and if the paste has turned bright red, you have water contaminating your tank. The color change occurs within seconds so long immersion is not needed or recommended.

If you have tested positive, the only solution is to drain the tank and thoroughly dry it out, note that some fuel or water may be below the bottom outlet pipe. If you have to go this route, please remember that you are working with a potential bomb and take every possible precaution against detonation. Only work in the open air, not in your shed or garage and be aware that the slightest spark may prove disastrous! The empty tank will contain explosive vapors so remain vigilant.

Craig Faulk Tells All...How It All Started

It was history time at the May chapter meeting at Craft Breww City. Craig Faulk talked to us about his early experiences with MG cars and his involvement with the formation of the Michigan Chapter of the MG T Register. Starting with the encouragement of his father as a teen, Craig got involved with working on and driving early MG's. He attended some of the earliest Register GoF's in New England. Spotting a T-car on the street one afternoon, he and his dad tracked down the owner and made the acquaintance of Pat McHugh. Later, as more owners of these cheap (at the time) old British cars found one another, they started to meet in the basement family rooms of Malcolm Castle and Maurice Horgar. Craig may have been the youngest T-car driver in that bunch.

As I recall his story, they traveled together to the Gatherings in the northeast for the mutual support along the road. This was well before any sort of GoF Central, GoF South or other regional meets. Eventually, they formed a club and became a chapter of the Register in 1971. Soon the chapter became famous for their rivalry with the Ohio chapter in competing for the Beaulieu Cup—awarded to the chapter with the most members driving the most miles to the New England GOF.

From the Chapter archives Ken Klemmer was able to dig up a typed membership list dated 11/11/71. Some members will remember a handful of the original folks, others will scratch their heads. But Wm. Craig Faulk is there. As is John Twist! I would guess pretty much everyone else has passed away— most recently Pat McHugh and George Patrick. The attached photos show the historical origins of the early Michigan MG-T Chapter.

University Motors 50th Birthday Party

No, Gladys. John Twist is NOT Oliver Twist's little brother!

What MG aficionado has not heard of the inimitable John Twist? I first did around 1980 when I subscribed to the now-defunct *MG Magazine* that featured tech articles by a guy from Grand Rapids named John Twist. He ran a shop called University Motors and every afternoon he set aside an hour to take phone calls from MG owners who were stuck with something MG for which they needed advice or guidance. I was one of those callers while trying to rebuild the front-end of my TD in a cold one-car garage a few blocks from City Line Ave. in Philadelphia.

University Motors stopped servicing MGs in late 2016. But John has continued being a technical resource and roving MG guru "trading as" University Motors Online. Most people who have been around MGs are familiar with his famous "rolling tech sessions" at gatherings around the country, his YouTube videos, his monthly Zoom meetings that draw hundreds from around the globe.

Last November 26 marked exactly 50 years to the day and date that John opened University Motors. It was celebrated with a 50th birthday party at the same hotel in Grand Rapids that has hosted the MG Summer Party for many years. A convivial group of MG owners from the Great Lakes area gathered, and most impressively, a cadre of former University Motors employees spanning all 50 years.


All things MG have been John's bailiwick since he bought his first one, a TD in 1968. Although interrupted by a couple of years in Vietnam, the TD never did get finished. Then college got interrupted by friends paying him to fix their MGs. Day jobs at a few automotive businesses did not pan out and John moved to England where he worked at the original University Motors dealership learning and fixing—you guessed it— MGs, and probably other British cars as well. Around 1973 John moved back to Grand Rapids and starting buying and selling MG parts. Then, in 1974, he bought a rundown garage for \$3500 and went into full-time business. With increasing success, University Motors moved a couple times eventually finding a home in a large building in Ada, on the outskirts of Grand Rapids.


Today, University Motors lives on with John sharing his mechanical knowledge on the web, with daily phone consultations, through in-person seminars around the country, and on his Youtube channel. Like our MG cars, John Twist has gotten a bit older, but he's still wearing the same hats.






Bob Humphrey and Friends Pull His MGC Motor at Belden Garage

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
